What have you done during the pandemic to help others? I created and ran a professional health course focused on LGBTQIA+ and gender affirming health issues. I have also worked in the emergency room and ICU to provide care for patients who are alone and suffering in the hospital because of COVID-19, as well as their families.

What is one pandemic silver lining? That human beings are resilient and evolving, and we are able to recognize health disparities in communities of color and work together to address them.

What is your special talent? Coming from a multi-ethnic background and a low-income neighborhood, and being a cancer fighter and survivor, I can empathize with other people who are suffering. With my ability to connect, I can deliver compassionate healthcare and offer reassurance to communities of color and lower socioeconomic groups. I am truly passionate about affirming all intersectionalities that make people who they are.

What is a special memory of Vallejo? I helped direct a 2-week Biotech Academy Summer Internship for local underrepresented minority high school students. The program was aimed at inspiring youth to explore the field of healthcare. Seeing children's eyes light up as they discovered opportunities in their own community was absolutely heartwarming. Patients as well as the next generation of healthcare providers need to see people like themselves in these fields.

What is a favorite place to hang out in Vallejo? Elev8 Training on Mare Island has a wonderfully diverse community of people who come together for gym sessions and classes. El Comalito Collective Cultural Arts Center showcases underrepresented artists in various media.

What is your favorite Vallejo community event? Día de los Muertos in downtown Vallejo.
